WORKERS' COMPENSATION BOARD COVID-19 Work Related Injuries – Summary October 8, 2021

Issue

Questions may be asked about the number of workers contracting COVID-19 in the course of employment.

Response

- Similar to all Canadian jurisdictions, workplace compensation in Saskatchewan is available for *work-related* injuries or illnesses.
- When determining if a worker has contracted COVID-19 through employment, WCB will consider if:
 - The nature and location of the worker's employment or employment activities have created an elevated risk of contracting COVID-19 (i.e., involves sufficient exposure).
 - o The worker's COVID-19 has been medically confirmed.
 - The time from the date of exposure and the onset of COVID-19 has been established to exist in the workplace.
- As the number of COVID-19 cases increase, multiple potential sources exist at work, home and in the community, which creates challenges in establishing the link between the exposure and employment. Decisions to accept COVID-19 claims are made by determining if it's more likely than not that employment was the most probable source of the COVID-19.
- 68% of COVID-19 injury claims are accepted as having arisen out of and in the course of employment.

Background

COVID-19 Injury Claims by Industry and Occupation

- Over 54% of the COVID-19 injury claims reported are from workers within two industry rate codes:
 - o 39.75% from G22 (Health Authority, Hospitals, Care Homes).
 - o 15.05% from G51 (Government of Saskatchewan and Ministries).

Disallowed COVID-19 Injury Claims

- The following situations do not indicate a work injury under *The Workers' Compensation Act, 2013* and are considered disallowed:
 - Worker withdraws from work to be tested for COVID-19.
 - o Worker withdraws from work for preventative measures.
 - o Worker is sent home on a precautionary basis by their employer.
- Should a worker develop symptoms after leaving work where it can be confirmed that they were exposed and a COVID-19 diagnosis has been provided, it may be considered a work injury.
